Bueno de Mesquita's expected utility model has become an accepted model for explaining international interaction. It is a comprehensive model which provides explanatory and predictive power, yet there are cases where this model fails to explain or predict state actions. Using a heteroskedastic probit model, I demonstrate that the unexplained cases are not merely random; they are predictable based on a model using psychological theories of the etiology and consequences of conduct disorder. This new approach furthers the study of international relations by creating a broader framework within which to place our already existing theories of state behavior. This approach demonstrates that all states, regardless of the expected utility of an action, should not always be viewed equally from a foreign policy or international relations research perspective. In other words, all states do not have the same decision making calculus, and this model helps group states based on these differences.
