CONGRATULATIONS!

Three GINT faculty – Don Songer, Steve Hays and Natalie H. Kaufman – have been named as the 2002 recipients of major University and College awards.

Don Songer has been awarded the USC Educational Foundation Research Award for Humanities and Social Sciences, which, along with the Russell Award, is the University's most prestigious annual prize for research and scholarship. The Department last had a Russell Award recipient in 1998 when Harvey Starr was named; the last GINT winner of the Educational Foundation Award was Ann Bowman in 1991.

Steve Hays and **Natalie Kaufman** were named to the two Louise Fry Scudder Professorships awarded annually by the College of Liberal Arts. This award is presented in recognition of a sustained and balanced record in teaching, research, and service contributions outside the University. Faculty named to this award have the distinction of being recognized as Scudder Professors during the rest of their careers at USC.

The grant will involve a collaborative study of the decisions of the top appellate courts in ten countries. Co-PIs for the study are Reggie Sheehan of Michigan State (1991 GINT Ph.D.), Neal Tate of North Texas, and Stacy Haynie of Louisiana State. The grant funding will total

\$425,000.
