NOTE: Standard Major is minimum 27 hours of Anthro NOT COUNTING ANTH 101 and ANTH 102. DURT is 33 hours NOT COUNTING ANTH 101 and ANTH 102

COGNATE: A minimum 12 hours in advanced courses (usually 300 or above but see advising guidelines pg. 21 for specific departments) in other departments related to and supporting the major. Courses should be junior-senior level and must be approved in advance by the advisor. Cognate courses may be taken in one or more departments. All cognate courses must be passed with a grade of C or better.

MINOR: A minor consists of 18 hours of prescribed courses, as set out by the department of the minor. The minor is intended to develop a coherent basic preparation in a second area of study. It differs from the cognate in that the courses must be concentrated in one area and follow a structured sequence. Students must register their minor with the CAS Advising office (258 Gambrell). Students who wish to use courses in their major department for minor credit must petition the College Committee on Standards and Petitions for permission to do so. No course may satisfy both major and minor requirements. All minor courses must be passed with a grade of C or better.
